1. INTRODUCTION

- (1) a. and [he] **suffryd ever** grete penaunce for Goddis sake in weryng of the heyre
and [he] suffered always great penance for God's sake in wearing of the hair
(*Life of St. Edmund* 165.61 / Han (1999: 13))
- b. Here men **vndurstonden ofte** by þis nyȝt þe nyȝt of synne.
here men understood often by this night the night of sin
(*Wycliffite Sermons* I, 477.605 / *ibid.*)
- (2) a. Monye men han a maner **to ete ofte** for to drynke
many men have a manner to eat often in-order to drink
(*Wycliffite Sermons* I, 478.631 / Han (1999: 13))
- b. þe oþur was þat God wold ȝeue hur þat grace, to hur þat was þe modur of God **to do**
the other was that God would give her that grace to her that was the mother of God to do
always plesaund seruyse to God.
always pleasing service to God
(*Sermons from the MS Royal* 256.260 / *ibid.*)
- (3) A DIAGNOSIS FOR VERB MOVEMENT: the position of the verb relative to the negative marker

2. BASIC FACTS

2.1. Observation by Han (1999)

- (5) WORD ORDER POSSIBILITY: I. *not-to-V* order: 14 instances
II. *to-V-not* order: 14 instances
- (6) Infinitival verb movement is obligatory in ME.

2.2. Optionality of Infinitival Verb Movement

- (7) *NOT TO V*
a. for I have i-lernd [to telle þis wonder, and **not to discreve** what it schulde mene
because I have learned to tell this wonder and not to describe what it should mean
(POLYCH, VIII, 89.206 / *PPCME*)

- b. the defense is doon anon withouten intervale or withouten taryng or delay, that right axeth a the defense is done soon without interval or without tarryng or delay that right askes a man [for to deffenden hym and **nat for to vengen** hym].
man for to defend him and not for to avenge him (CTPROS, 232.C1.120 / *ibid.*)

(8) *TO V NOT*

- a. And herfore monye men vson wel [**to come not** in bedde wiþ schetis, but be and therefore many men are-accostomed well to come not in bed with sheets but be hulude aboue þe bed]
covered above the bed (WYCSER, I, 479.641 / *PPCME*)
- b. þat he doos [**to sorow noght** for hys syn] as he sulde do; [**to dispoos** hym **noght** and if **to use it noght** als ne **to kepe it noght**];
use it not as than to keep it not (ROLLFL, 99.261 / *ibid.*)

(9) *TO NOT V (FROM PPCME)*

- þat is to siggen þat þou ziue þin entent [**to don alle þe dedes to honour of God, and nouzt** that is to say that you give your intent to do all the deeds to honour of God and not aʒeyn his wille **don** wiþ eny of þi fiue wittes]
against his will do with any of the five wits (EDVERN, 240.42 / *PPCME*)

(10) *TO NOT V (FROM OED AND VISSER (1966))*

- a. It is good [**for to not ete** fleisch, and **for to not drynke** wyn],
it is good for to not eat flesh and for to not drink wine (1382 Wyclif Rom. xiv. 21 / *OED*)
- b. Yf þou wolt lerne & can eny þinge profitably, loue [**to not be** known] and to be accountyd if you will learn and know any thing profitably love to not be known and to be accounted as nought.
as nothing (<c>1500 tr. Imit. Chr. 4. 7 / Visser (1966: 1040))

(13) *TO V ... AND V NOT*

- a. þe toþir maner o mekenes is, sais sain benet, [**For to** hate yure ahen propir wyl, **And fulfil** the other manner of meekness is says saint benet for to hate your own proper will and fulfill **noght** yure langing, bot do godis wylle, and his desire fulfille];
not your longing but do God's will and his desire fulfill (BENRUL, 12.355 / *PPCME*)

- b. and he hath nede [**to** lyue a clene lif, and be ful deuout in preiers, *and haue not* his wit]
and he has need to live a clean life and be full devout in preyers and have not his wit
(PURVEY, I, 56.127 / *ibid.*)
- (14) *TO V ADV DP*_{OBJECT}
a. what spiryt makith sithen idiotis hardi the foure greeete doctouris dursten neuere do this? [**to**
what spirit makes then idiots hardy the four great doctors dared never do this to
translate now [**the bible**] into English],
translate now the bible into English (PURVEY, I, 56.92 / *PPCME*)
b. De oþur was þat God wold zeue hur þat grace, to hur þat was þe modur of God [**to do**
the other was that God would give her that grace to her that was the mother of God to do
uer [**plesaund seruyse**] to God].
always pleasing service to God (ROYAL, 256.260 / *ibid.*)
- (15) WORD ORDER POSSIBILITY: I. *not-to-V* order
II. *to-not-V* order
III. *to-V-not* order
- (16) Infinitival verb movement is optional in ME (and EModE).
- (17) The *to-V-not* order attested during the seventeenth century cannot be considered as the cases of
infinitival verb movement. (cf. (12))
- (18) *TO V NOT* IN 17C.
I. *to-V-not* order with *be*: 5 instances
II. *not* (and its variants) functioning as a constituent negator: 4 instances
III. *nought* (and its variants) functioning as a direct object or adjective with the meaning ‘nothing’:
3 instances
- (19) a. Which we shall labour [to induce *not* from postulates and entreated Maxims].
(1646 Sir T. Browne Pseud. Ep. 296 / *OED*)
b. Experience, that great Teacher, tels us [to be *nought*], at all times to undertake for health.
(1658 A. Fox tr. Würtz' Surg. ii. i. 47 / *ibid.*)
- (20) In Present-day English, the *to-V-not* order is possible only with the auxiliary *have* and *be*.
(cf. Pollock (1989), Iatridou (1990))
- (21) a. To not have played football for many years is a disadvantage in a major game.
b. To have not played football for many years is a disadvantage in a major game.
(Iatridou (1990: 574))
- (21') a. ambiguous: *not > many / many > not*
b. unambiguous: *many > not*
- (22) I. The *to-V-not* order with the auxiliary *have* and *be* in Present-day English cannot be derived by
verb movement. (cf. Iatridou (1990))
II. The infinitival verb movement was already nonexistent in the seventeenth century, and it was
lost during the sixteenth century.
- (23) a. They counseiled the kynge **to tary not**, but to ouir-ride his reaueme.
they counseiled the king to tarry not but to override his realm
(*<c>1500 Three Kings' Sons 144 / OED*)

- (51) Instances of the *not-to-V* order exceeds those of the *to-not-V* in number.
- I. This might be due to the status of the lower negative marker: the lower negator might be the relic of adverbial *not*.
 - II. The *to-not-V* order is not always interchangeable with the *not-to-V* order and vice versa. (cf. 長原 (2000))

(52) INFINITIVAL MORPHEME IN SCANDINAVIAN LANGUAGES

- a. Icelandic: *-a*
- b. Swedish: *-a* (cf. Vikner (1997))

(53) ICELANDIC

- a. *María lofaði [að lesa ekki [VP t_{lesa} bækur]].*
Mary promised to read not books (Thráinsson (1993: 186))
- b. *Risarnir lofudu [að éta ríkisstjórnina ekki [VP t_{éta} t_{ríkisstjórnina}]].*
the-giants promise to eat the-government not (ibid.: 203)

(54) SWEDISH

- Maria lovade [att inte läsa böcker].*
Mary promised to not read books (Thráinsson (1993: 186))

(55) INFINITIVAL VERB MOVEMENT

- a. Icelandic: obligatory --- The D-feature of Inf_n is strong.
- b. Swedish: impossible --- The D-feature of Inf_n is weak and cannot tolerate an unforced violation of Procrastinate.
